

City of Thomasville Council Meeting, June 14, 2021

The Council of the City of Thomasville met in a regular session with Mayor Greg Hobbs presiding and the following Councilmembers present: Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Jay Flowers and Todd Mobley. Also present were the City Manager, J. Alan Carson; City Attorney, Tim Sanders; and other staff. The meeting was held in Council Chambers at City Hall, located at 144 East, Jackson Street, Thomasville, Georgia.

This meeting was held in a manner that observed active Executive Orders and Health Advisories provided by Georgia Governor Kemp, Centers for Disease Control, Department of Health, and local health officials in response to the coronavirus pandemic. Seating was limited and additional safety measures were required such as, but not limited to, social distancing and wearing of facial coverings to ensure the health and safety of meeting participants and the citizens of Thomasville. Simultaneous access to the meeting was provided to those members of the press and citizens not present via the City of Thomasville's online live stream feed located at www.thomasville.org.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Greg Hobbs called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM. It was noted that Councilmember Warren was not present at this meeting.

INVOCATION

Councilmember Flowers led the Invocation.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler led the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Councilmember Flowers motioned to approve the Council Meeting Minutes of May 14, 2021, as presented. Councilmember Mobley seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

CITIZENS TO BE HEARD

Mayor Hobbs acknowledged the following citizens to be heard as listed on the sign in sheet:

1. Nate Tyler addressed Council on behalf of the NAACP in regards to President Biden's Executive Order No. 13985. He conveyed the NAACP wanted to ensure that all municipalities understood the President's Executive Order and implored the Thomasville City Council to make extraordinary efforts in assisting the underserved communities in Thomasville that have been impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic.
2. Shirley Jackson, First Vice President of NAACP, also addressed Council in regards to the Presidential Order No. 13985. She conveyed the NAACP requested the elected officials be thoughtful and fair in bringing equality to communities. Ms. Jackson noted people of color have been greatly affected by the pandemic and the NAACP wanted to ensure that Council is aware of the needs within their communities. On behalf of the NAACP, Ms. Jackson requested that Council solicit non-traditional ways to ensure pandemic funding that is being sent to municipalities and organizations is used to assist the people of the underserved communities in Thomasville.
3. Keith Thomas commended the City Manager's decision of hiring Thomasville Police Chief John Letteney. He also thanked Chief Letteney for his support provided to an officer during the death of family members.
4. Matt Kirkley inquired if Council was aware of the live stream's technical difficulties surrounding the most recent Utilities Commission meeting. He reported that he was unable to access the video posted online. Mr.

Kirkley also inquired if Council was aware that the subsequent Policy meetings; which had been publicized to follow the Utilities Commission meetings, were not being live streamed. Mayor Hobbs indicated that policy meetings were not live streamed and requested City Manager Carson to have staff assess any technical issues related to the Utilities Commission meeting. City Manager Carson reported the Utilities Commission meeting had been held at a location in which a live stream feed was not available, the meeting was recorded for later posting online and he would have staff address any issues. City Manager Carson further reported the Policy meetings are not live streamed and due to schedule conflicts have not been held as desired.

ADOPT AGENDA

Councilmember Mobley motioned to adopt the agenda as presented, with no exceptions. Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

OLD BUSINESS

Second reading of an ordinance to deannex four properties located on Baytree Drive in Thomasville, Georgia. City Planner, Kenny Thompson, reported there were no changes to the ordinance since the first reading and passage by Council at the May 24, 2021 Council Meeting. City Planner Thompson briefly reviewed the deannexation request and procedure. It was noted the four vacant lots were addressed as 294, 332, 340 and 358 of Baytree Drive, Thomasville, Georgia. It was further noted that the properties were currently vacant land, so no revenue would be lost by deannexing the parcels, and Thomas County has been notified of the deannexation request. City Planner Thompson reported Thomas County has approved the absorption of the properties back into the county.

Councilmember Flowers motioned to order the ordinance to deannex four properties located on Baytree Drive in Thomasville, Georgia as read for the second times, passed and adopted as presented. Councilmember Mobley seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

The ordinance ordered read for the second time, passed and adopted follows.

AN ORDINANCE TO DEANNEX CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY FROM THE CITY OF THOMASVILLE PURSUANT TO AND IN CONFORMITY WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF O.C.G.A. §36-36-22, UPON THE REQUEST OF BROOKWOOD SCHOOL, INC., THE OWNER OF THE REAL PROPERTY PROPOSED TO BE DEANNEXED FROM THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF THOMASVILLE; TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND TO ESTABLISH AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

SECTION I

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF THOMASVILLE, GEORGIA and it is hereby ordained by the authority of same, that the real property more particularly described below ("Real Property"), all of the interests in such Real Property being owned by Brookwood School, Inc. that executed a petition formally requesting the Real Property be deannexed from the corporate limits of the City of Thomasville, a copy of which is located in the files of the City Clerk, is hereby deannexed from the corporate limits of the City of Thomasville pursuant to and in conformity with the requirements of O.C.G.A. §36-36-22:

All those tracts or parcels of land situate, lying and being in Land Lot No. 200 of the 18th Land District of Thomas County, Georgia, and being identified as Lot Numbers 11, 12, 13 and 14, as these lots are more particularly shown on that plat of survey of Bay Tree Estates prepared by Leroy Ouzts, Ga. Reg. Surveyor No. 1654, dated December 3, 1982, recorded in Plat Book 5, Page 194

among the deed records of the Clerk of the Superior Court of Thomas County, Georgia(the "Plat"), and more particularly described as follows:

COMMENCE at the point where the northeast margin of Bay Tree Drive intersects the southwest margin of U.S. Highway 319 as shown on the Plat; run thence north 45 degrees 28 minutes 48 seconds east along the northwest margin of the right of way of U. S. Highway 319 a distance of 149.41 feet to an iron pin at the southeast corner of Bay Tree Estates as shown on the Plat; run thence north 31 degrees 27 minutes 17 seconds west a distance of 1584.81 feet to a concrete monument at the northeast corner of Bay Tree Estates and the point of beginning. From said Point of Beginning, run thence south 88 degrees 59 minutes 17 seconds west a distance of 403.14 feet to a point at the northwest corner of Lot 14 of Bay Tree Estates as shown on the Plat; run thence south 00 degrees 31 minutes 51 seconds east a distance of 160 feet to a point on the north margin of the right of way of Bay Tree Drive; run thence north 88 degrees 59 minutes 17 seconds east along the north margin of the right of way of Bay Tree Drive a distance of 498.80 feet to a point; run thence north 31 degrees 27 minutes 17 seconds west a distance of 185.00 feet to the concrete monument and the point of beginning.

SECTION II

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to deliver a certified copy of this ordinance to the Department of Community Affairs and the Thomas County Board of Commissioners as required by O.C.G.A. §36-36-22.

SECTION III

This ordinance shall be effective on the date of its final reading and passage.

SECTION IV

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION V

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED and it is hereby declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council of the City of Thomasville that all sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrase of this Ordinance are and were, upon their enactment, believed by the Mayor and the Council to be fully valid, enforceable, and constitutional.

SECTION VI

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED and it is hereby declared by the Mayor and the Council of the City of Thomasville that (i) to the greatest extent allowed by law, each and every section paragraph sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is severable from every other section paragraph sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance and (ii) that to the greatest extent allowed by law, no section paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of his ordinance is mutually dependent upon any other section paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of his ordinance.

SECTION VII

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED and it is hereby declared that in the event that any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall, for any reason whatsoever, be declared invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by the valid judgement or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, it is the express intent of the Mayor and the Council of the City of Thomasville that such invalidity, unconstitutionality or unenforceability shall, to the greatest extent allowed by law, not render invalid unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable any of the remaining

phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or section of the Ordinance and that to the greatest extent allowed by law, all remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections of this ordinance shall remain valid, constitutional, enforceable, and of full force and effect.

SECTION VIII

This ordinance shall not be made a part of the official codified ordinances of the City of Thomasville, but shall nevertheless be spread upon the public minutes and records of the City of Thomasville.

SECTION IX

This ordinance was introduced and read at a lawful meeting of the City council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia, held on May 24, 2021, and read the second time, passed and adopted in like meeting held on June 14, 2021.

NEW BUSINESS

Resolution of Emergency to allow for the first and second readings, at this one meeting, of an Ordinance Imposing a Moratorium on the use of Shared Mobility Devices within the City of Thomasville.

City Attorney, Tim Sanders, reviewed the procedure as provided in the Municipal Code of Thomasville, Section 2-2. Procedure for passage of ordinance, allowing for an ordinance to be read, passed and adopted by Council for the first and second times at one meeting under a resolution of emergency. Attorney Sanders reported that the resolution of emergency requires the affirmative vote of four (4) members of the City Council. It was noted that Council had requested research to be conducted to determine whether Shared Mobility Devices should be allowed in the City of Thomasville and if so, under what circumstances and conditions.

Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler motioned to adopt a resolution of emergency to allow for the first and second readings, at this one meeting, of an ordinance imposing a moratorium on the use of Shared Mobility Devices within the City of Thomasville. Councilmember Flowers seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

The adopted Resolution of Emergency follow.

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED, that in the interest of public health and safety and in an effort to afford the Mayor and Council of the City of Thomasville time in which to gather information and consider whether Shared Mobility Devices should be allowed in the City of Thomasville and if so under what circumstances and conditions, there exists an emergency status of need requiring the adoption of an ordinance imposing a moratorium on the use of Shared Mobility Devices within the City of Thomasville on first and second readings at this one meeting pursuant to City of Thomasville Ordinance Section 2-2.

SO DONE this the 14th day of June 2021.

First and second readings of an Ordinance Imposing a Moratorium on the use of Shared Mobility Devices within the City of Thomasville.

City Attorney Sanders explained there has been a proliferation of the operation of shared electric scooters and other shared mobility devices in and outside the State of Georgia that are operated on public sidewalks and roadways. He further explained Council requested a study be conducted and recommendation made as to whether or not these devices should be allowed in the City of Thomasville and if so, under what circumstances and conditions. Attorney Sanders

noted this ordinance places a moratorium on the use of shared mobility devices, also known as “e-scooters”, so as to provide Council adequate time to consider the operation of the use of such devices in the interest of health, safety and well-being of members of the public who use city sidewalks and city streets.

Councilmember Mobley motioned to order the ordinance imposing a moratorium on the use of Shared Mobility Devices within the City of Thomasville as ordered read for the first and second times, under resolution of emergency, passed and adopted at this one meeting as presented. Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler seconded. Councilmembers briefly discussed how other Georgia cities have been affected with the recreational use of rented e-scooters within their communities. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

The ordinance ordered read for the first and second times, under resolution of emergency follows.

ORDINANCE IMPOSING A MORATORIUM ON THE USE OF SHARED MOBILITY DEVICES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF THOMASVILLE; TO ESTABLISH AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

WHEREAS, there has been a proliferation of the operation of shared electric scooters and other shared mobility devices in and outside the State of Georgia that are operated on public sidewalks and roadways; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, deems it appropriate to have the city manager conduct a study and make a recommendation as to how, if at all, the operation of such devices should be permitted within the city, all in the interests of the health, safety and well-being of members of the public who use city sidewalks and the city street system;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, as follows.

SECTION I

A moratorium is hereby declared on the use or operation of devices hereinafter defined as shared mobility devices, within the corporate limits of Thomasville, Georgia, pending a study by the city manager and a recommendation from the city manager as to how, if at all, the operation of such devices should be permitted within the city.

SECTION II

“Shared mobility device” means any wheeled device, other than an automobile, motorcycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric assisted bicycle, electric personal transportation vehicles, moped, golf cart, or personal transportation vehicle as those devices are defined by state law, that is powered by a motor; is accessed via an on-demand portal, whether a smartphone application, membership card, or similar method; is operated by a private entity that owns, manages, and maintains devices for shared use by members of the public; and is available to members of the public in unstaffed, self-service locations.

SECTION III

This moratorium shall apply to all city streets, sidewalks, parks, and other city owned and controlled property. This moratorium shall have no applicability to the use of such devices on private property. This moratorium shall expire at 11:59 p.m., eastern standard time, on December 13, 2021.

SECTION IV

In addition to any other remedies available to the city as provided by law, any person or entity violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished as provided by the Code of Ordinances of the City of Thomasville.

SECTION V

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that all ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed for purposes of this ordinance only.

SECTION VI

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that the provisions of this ordinance shall not be made a part of the official codified ordinances of the City of Thomasville but shall nonetheless be spread upon the minutes and public records of the City of Thomasville.

SECTION VII

Following the passage of a resolution of emergency, this ordinance was introduced and read at a lawful meeting of the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, held on Monday, May 14, 2021, and read a second time, passed and adopted that same meeting.

SECTION VIII

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that this ordinance shall be effective as of the date of its second reading and final passage.

Resolution to appoint John Gregory to the Main Street Advisory Board.

Councilmember Jay Flowers reported a vacancy had on the Main Street Advisory Board with the resignation of Downtown Merchant Member, Tripp Brock. Councilmember Flowers further reported that John Gregory, owner of Empire Bagel located on West Jackson Street, has agreed to serve, if appointed, to fill the vacancy as a Downtown Merchant member on the Main Street Advisory Board for a term expiring December 31, 2021.

Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler motioned to adopt the resolution to appoint John Gregory to the Main Street Advisory Board as presented. Councilmember Flowers seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

The adopted resolution follows.

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF THOMASVILLE

WHEREAS, the City Council is vested with the authority to appoint persons to various boards, commissions, and authorities and the City Council desires to exercise such authority; and,

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting, duly publicized and open to the public, a quorum of the City Council of the City of Thomasville adopted a resolution which included the appointment of Tripp Brock to serve on the Main Street Advisory Board as a Downtown Merchant Representative for a term expiring December 31, 2021; and,

WHEREAS, Tripp Brock formally resigned his appointed position on the Main Street Advisory Board, thereby creating an unexpired and vacant position on the Main Street Advisory Board.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Thomasville, and it is hereby resolved by the authority of the same, that John Gregory is hereby appointed to fill the

aforementioned unexpired term as a Downtown Merchant Representative on the Main Street Advisory Board, for a term expiring December 31, 2021.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution shall become effective upon its adoption.

SO RESOLVED, this the 14th day of June, 2021.

Motion to accept a donation from the William Howard Flowers, Jr. Foundation, Inc. for the purchase of pre-trained Police K-9 and Handler Training Course.

Police Chief, John Letteney reported the Police Department is in need of a K-9 to replace K-9 “Tank” who retired from service in October, 2020. Chief Letteney further reported the William Howard Flowers, Jr. Foundation has made a donation the Thomasville Police Department in the amount of \$15,000 for the purchase of a pre-trained police K-9 and for the K-9 and Handler to attend certification training. It was noted the new K-9 will be pre-trained by the originating kennel in general police K-9 tasks. Once selected, the Thomasville Police Officer designated as the K-9 Handler will travel to the kennel facility to work with dog and the team will become certified to operate as a Police K-9 Team. City Attorney Sanders reported Councilmember Flowers has familial ties with the donor; however, as no punitive residuary would be received by Councilmember Flowers for the donation and therefore a conflict of interest does not exist. Attorney Sanders noted Councilmember Flowers was permitted to participate in the discussion and subsequent vote on this matter.

Councilmember Flowers motioned to accept the donation from the William Howard Flowers, Jr. Foundation and to authorize the donation for the stated purpose. Councilmember Mobley seconded. Councilmembers collectively requested City Manager Carson to extend their appreciation to the William Howard Flowers, Jr. Foundation for their generosity. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

Motion to approve Alcohol License for Retail Consumption of Beer and Wine – Hubs and Hops Rentals.

Event Facilities, Business & Tax Licensing Administrator, Melissa Creel reported applicants/owners Jackie Lawson and Roger Hawkes, Hubs and Hops Rentals, located at 227 West Jackson Street, Thomasville, Georgia, has completed all paperwork relating to their application for license to engage in the business of Retail Consumption of Beer and Wine for the establishment. Administrator Creel further reported the applicants had been thorough the proper procedures and there were no issues or concerns found. It was noted that the licenses issued by the City are conditioned upon the applicant obtaining a like permit from the Georgia Department of Revenue, Alcohol, and Tobacco Tax unit.

Councilmember Mobley motioned to approve the Alcohol Beverage License for Hubs and Hops Rentals as presented. Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

Following the approval of the Alcohol Beverage License for Hubs and Hops Rentals, Mayor Hobbs read the following statement to the owners, who were present:

“As part of your application processes, you each signed an affidavit stating that you understand the sale of alcoholic beverages to an underage person is an illegal act, punishable by law, in the State of Georgia; and, You all understand the code requirements as they relate to the required training program and prohibition of sales of alcoholic beverages to an underage person; and, You all received a copy of the current Thomasville Municipal Code Chapter 3, titled “Alcoholic Beverages”.

Motion to approve Alcohol One Day Event Permit for Consumption of Beer and Wine, “Oakfest” at The Ritz Amphitheater on June 26, 2021.

Event Facilities, Business & Tax Licensing Administrator, Melissa Creel reported the Thomasville Treehouse Advocacy Center, Inc. / Kiwanis has submitted a completed City of Thomasville Application for a One-Day Permit for Sale of Alcoholic Beverage by Bona Fide Charitable & Non-Profit Civic Organization (Consumption Only) for the annual fundraising event “OakFest” to be held at The Ritz Amphitheater in downtown Thomasville on June 26, 2021, from 3:00 PM until 10:00 PM. City Council approval of the One-Day Alcohol permit is required as the event will be held on property owned by the City. The Thomasville Police Department found no reason not to issue the One-Day Alcohol permit.

Councilmember Flowers motioned to approve the One-Day Alcohol Event Permit for the Children’s Treehouse Advocacy Center of Thomas County, Inc. / Kiwanis as presented. Councilmember Mobley seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

Bids and award for lease equipment for Water, Waste Water, Gas and Public Works Departments.

Director of Utility Operations, Chris Hayes reported the lease agreement will consist of (6) Mid Class Backhoes, (2) Small Class Excavators, and (1) Compact Track Loader for the Wastewater, Water, Gas, and Public Works Departments. The current lease which begin in August of 2016 will reach the end of terms in August 2021 and were budgeted at \$74,053.36 per year. The new lease terms are the same as previous years, with 600 hours per year / 5 years term at the amount of \$65,665.92, per year. Due to specialize tooling previously purchased (forks, different size buckets), only two bids were received by departments. A summary of bids received follows.

Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler motioned to approve the award for lease agreement to Flint Equipment of Albany, Georgia for six (6) Mid Class Backhoes, two (2) Small Class Excavators, and one (1) Compact Track Loader for the Wastewater, Water, Gas, and Public Works Departments, utilizing 2021-2026 Departmental funds set forth in each of the department’s respective budgets. Councilmember Mobley seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.

CONSENT AGENDA

There were no items to be considered on the Consent Agenda at the meeting.

REPORTS

City Manager Carson reported that the City of Thomasville administrative offices would be closed on Friday, June 18, 2021 in observance of the Juneteenth. He thanked Councilmembers for their forethought in recognizing Juneteenth as a holiday. He further reported that the annual Juneteenth Celebration would be held at Douglass High School campus on Saturday, June 18, 2021. City Manager Carson also commended Chris White, Sheryl Sealy and staff for their efforts of City of Thomasville daily operations during his absence of the prior week.

Councilmembers echoed the City Manager’s sentiments and encouraged citizens to attend the Juneteenth Celebration. Councilmember Mobley thanked Police Chief Letteney, and TPD officers, for their support and presence during Thomasville High School’s Graduation Ceremonies.

Executive Session

Councilmember Mobley motioned to close the public meeting to convene in Executive Session to discuss negotiations to purchase, dispose of or lease property pursuant to O.C.G.A. 50-14-3 (b)(1)(B). Councilmember Flowers seconded. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 4-0, with the following votes recorded:

AYES: Mayor Hobbs, Mayor Pro Tem Hufstetler and Councilmembers Flowers and Mobley.


Other staff, members of the press and citizens exited the Council Chambers.
