

City of Thomasville Council Meeting Minutes, June 22, 2026

The Council of the City of Thomasville met in regular session on the above date. Mayor Scott Chastain presided, and the following Councilmembers were present: Mayor Pro Tem Lucinda Brown and Councilmembers Todd Mobley, Terry Scott and Royal Baker. Also present were the City Manager, Chris White; Assistant City Manager, Sheryl Sealy; City Attorney, Timothy C. Sanders; Chief Financial Officer, Ashley Cason; other city staff; citizens and members of the media. The meeting was held in Council Chambers at City Hall, located at 144 East Jackson Street, Thomasville, Georgia. Simultaneous access to the meeting was provided to those members of the media and citizens unable to attend the meeting via the City of Thomasville's online live stream feed located at www.thomasville.org.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Scott Chastain called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM.

INVOCATION

Councilmember Terry Scott gave the Invocation.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Pro Tem Lucinda Brown led the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Councilmember Todd Mobley moved to approve the City Council Regular Meeting Minutes of June 8, 2026, as presented. Councilmember Scott seconded the motion. There was no discussion. The motion passed 5-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Chastain, Brown, Mobley, Scott, Baker.

RECOGNITION

Honorary Councilmember June 2026: Mayor Pro Tem Brown recognized Felicia Ross as the Honorary Councilmember for the month of June 2026. She thanked Ms. Ross for her service to the community and encouraged her to continue working with the community's children. Mayor Pro Tem Brown presented Ms. Ross with a commemorative certificate.

CITIZENS TO BE HEARD

Mayor Chastain noted the following rules of decorum: During Citizens to be Heard, speakers shall only make comments that are relevant to the business and government of the City of Thomasville and that are related to public officials and City employees in their official capacities. Each speaker shall refrain from threats of violence and profanity. Citizens following the sign-in procedure listed on the sign-in sheet will be allowed three (3) minutes to address Council during Council Meeting. Mayor Chastain then acknowledged the following citizens listed on the Citizens to be Heard Sign-In Form:

1. Rosemarye Boykins, resident of August Avenue, Thomasville, Georgia, voiced her objections with the proposed subdivision of the property across the street from her home. She voiced concerns of inadequate property lot width, parking issues, two-way traffic on Augusta Avenue, street width, and safety concerns. She provided councilmembers with a detailed list of her concerns and requested that Councilmembers postpone any final votes on this matter until issues are fully reviewed and addressed.
 - a. It was noted that the property owner's request was in review by the Planning and Zoning Commission, who would provide recommendation to Council upon completion.
2. Laquetta Johnson, resident of Augusta Avenue, Thomasville, Georgia, also voiced concerns with the proposed subdivision of the Augusta Avenue properties. She noted similar safety concerns of street traffic, parking, and visibility issues in the area.
 - a. Mayor Chastain noted that Council would follow up with the proposed request and procedures. Mayor Pro Tem noted that someone would be in touch with both Ms. Boykins and Ms. Johnson.

3. Jeanette Dixon, resident of Cindy Drive, Thomasville, Georgia, presented animal control concerns on behalf of Red Road Rescue. She commended the City for having animal control ordinances in place to help address animal control issues and that she would also present her concerns to the Thomas County Board of Commissioners. She voiced concerns of roaming dogs, chained and tethered dogs with no access to food or water, concerns with rabies vaccination ordinances, and parvo outbreaks within the animal control facility.

ADOPT AGENDA

Councilmember Baker moved to adopt the agenda as presented. Mayor Pro Tem Brown seconded the motion. There was no discussion. The motion passed 5-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Chastain, Brown, Mobley, Scott, Baker.

OLD BUSINESS

Second reading of an ordinance to amend text of Chapter 2, Article V “Retirement” of the Thomasville Code of Ordinances.

Utilities Superintendent, Eric Gossett, reported that there had been no changes to the ordinance since its passage on first reading.

Councilmember Mobly moved to order the ordinance to amend text of Chapter 2, Article V “Retirement” of the Thomasville Code of Ordinances as read for the second time, passed and adopted, as presented. Councilmember Scott seconded the motion. There was no discussion. The motion passed 5-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Chastain, Brown, Mobley, Scott, Baker.

The adopted ordinance follows.

ORDINANCE NO.: ORD-XX-XXXX2026

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THOMASVILLE, GEORGIA, BY AMENDING CHAPTER 2, CAPTIONED “ADMINISTRATION”, ARTICLE V., CAPTIONED “RETIREMENT”, DIVISION 3., CAPTIONED “PENSIONS; DEFINED BENEFIT”, BY (1) AMENDING SECTION 2-221., CAPTIONED “DEFINITIONS.”, SO AS TO ADD A NEW DEFINITION FOR “RETIRED MEMBER” AND SO AS TO EXPAND DEFINITION OF “TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT”; AND, (2) AMENDING SECTION 2-222., CAPTIONED “PENSION BOARD OF TRUSTEES-DEFINED BENEFIT; ESTABLISHED, COMPOSITION, TERMS OFFICERS.”, BY AMENDING TEXT OF PARAGRAPHS (A) AND (B); AND, (3) AMENDING SECTION 2-228., CAPTIONED “REFUND OF CONTRIBUTIONS AND VESTED BENEFITS.” BY STRIKING IN ITS ENTIRETY SUBPARAGRAPH (A)(2); AND, (4) STRIKING IN ITS ENTIRETY SECTION 2-234 – 2-259, CAPTIONED “RESERVED”; AND, (5) ADDING A NEW SECTION 2-234., CAPTIONED “MEDICAL BENEFITS AND CONTINUATION OF MEDICAL BENEFITS FOR CLASS A, B, AND C PLAN MEMBERS.”; AND, (6) ADDING A NEW SECTION 2-235 – 2-259, CAPTIONED “RESERVED”; AND, (7) REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith; AND (8) PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

SECTION I

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that Chapter 2, captioned “Administration”, Article V, captioned “Retirement”; Division 3, captioned “Pensions; Defined benefit”; Section 2-221, captioned “Definitions”, is hereby amended as follows:

“Sec. 2-221. Definitions.

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Prior service under this plan means service for which the member had credit under the plan and received a refund of the member's contributions upon termination of employment with the city. The service must have been a service that was credited under the plan and the member must have terminated employment with the city and received a refund pursuant to the provisions of the plan.

Retired member means a member whose employment has terminated for any reason, including but not limited to the retirement of a member.

Salary means the salary received from the standard payroll period, exclusive of overtime pay. Salary shall include merit or other bonuses received for the performance of duties only.

Termination of employment or Retirement. Termination of employment or retirement occurs when a member ceases all employment relationships with the city. An authorized leave of absence shall constitute a continuation of the employment relationship, except that a leave of absence without pay due to disability may constitute termination for a member, if such member makes application for and is approved for disability retirement in accordance with section 2-224.

SECTION II

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that Chapter 2, captioned "Administration", Article V, captioned "Retirement"; Division 3, captioned "Pensions; Defined benefit"; Section 2-222, captioned "Pension board of trustees-Defined benefit; established, composition, terms, officers.", is hereby amended as follows:

"Sec. 2-222. Pension board of trustees-Defined benefit; established, composition, terms, officers.

- (a) There is hereby established, to serve without pay, a pension board of trustees of the city whose duties shall be to manage all funds paid into the plan, which shall be kept by the city treasurer as a separate fund covered by the city treasurer's bond as such. Until July 13, 2026, The the pension board of trustees shall consist of the mayor, one councilmember appointed by the mayor, the city manager, the utilities superintendent, the ~~city treasurer~~ chief financial officer, and four other employees of the city to be elected from, among and by the employees who are in the ~~act of~~ active service of the city and who are contributing to the defined benefit plan. Beginning effective July 13, 2026, the two trustee positions elected from the member employees of the general government and from the member employees of the utilities department shall be eliminated from the pension board of trustees and the pension board of trustees from that point forward shall consist of the mayor, one councilmember appointed by the mayor, the city manager, the utilities superintendent, the chief financial officer, the chief human resources officer, the assistant city manager, and two employees of the city to be elected from, among and by the employees who are in the active service of the city and who are contributing to the defined benefit plan. Effective July 13, 2026, Of the two elected members, one shall be at-large elected by and from the member employees of the general government, one by the member employees of the utilities department, shall be and two at-large, on which whom all member employees of the city may vote. In the event the office of the city manager shall become vacant, the person designated as assistant city manager shall serve on the pension board of trustees in the place of the city manager until a city manager shall be named and the person designated assistant utilities superintendent shall serve on the pension board of trustees in the place of the assistant city manager until a city manager shall be named. In the event of the office of the assistant city manager shall become vacant, the person designated as assistant utilities superintendent shall serve on the pension board of trustees in the place of the assistant city manager until an assistant city manager has been named. In the event the office of the city utilities superintendent shall become vacant, the person designated as assistant utilities superintendent shall serve on the pension board of trustees in the place of the superintendent until a superintendent has been named.

- (b) On the first Monday of each June, the employees of the city making contributions to the defined benefit plan at the time of the election shall vote upon a successor to such trustee whose term expires on the following July 1. The member receiving a majority of votes shall be elected for a term of four years, or until the member's successor is elected; provided, however, if no member receives a majority of votes on the first ballot, a run-off will be held on the third Monday of each June between the two members receiving the greatest number of votes in the first ballot, and the member who receives the majority of votes in the run-off shall be the elected member. The mayor, the city councilmember, city manager, city treasurer chief financial officer, and the utilities superintendent, chief human resources officers and assistant city manager shall be permanent members of the board and the term of each individual shall coincide with the mayor, the city councilmember, city manager, city treasurer chief financial officer, and the utilities superintendent's, chief human resources officer and assistant city manager's term of office with the city with respect to the mayor and councilmember and employment with respect to the city manager, the chief financial officer, utilities superintendent, chief human resources officer and assistant city manager. In the event of a vacancy among the elected trustees caused by the death, resignation or discontinuance of employment by the city or otherwise, the remaining trustees are authorized to elect a successor to serve the unexpired term of the trustee whose office has thus been vacated."

SECTION III

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that Chapter 2, captioned "Administration", Article V, captioned "Retirement"; Division 3, captioned "Pensions; Defined benefit"; Section 2-228, captioned "Refund of contributions and vested benefits.", subparagraph (a)(2) is hereby amended by striking it in its entirety as follows:

"Sec. 2-228. Refund of contributions and vested benefits.

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(2) ~~Notwithstanding anything contained in subsection (a)(1) of this section to the contrary, a city manager incurring a break in service and who has been refunded the total amount the city manager has paid into the pension plan, plus interest, may upon re-employment with the city, remit to the city an actuarially determined amount from the break in service until re-entry into the plan. For purposes of this subsection, the term "actuarially determined amount" shall mean that amount as determined by the actuary employed by the city as that amount to be remitted to the city by the city manager to provide a calculated benefit pursuant to section 2-226, as if the city manager had not incurred a break in service. The city manager who is re-employed with the city after incurring a break in service shall re-enter the plan upon payment of all actuarially determined amounts as if the city manager had not incurred a break in service.~~

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SECTION IV

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that Chapter 2, captioned "Administration", Article V, captioned "Retirement"; Division 3, captioned "Pensions; Defined benefit"; Sections 2-234-2-259., captioned "Reserved." is hereby amended by striking it in its entirety as follows:

"Sees. 2-234-2-259. Reserved."

SECTION V

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that Chapter 2, captioned "Administration", Article V, captioned "Retirement"; Division 3, captioned "Pensions; Defined benefit"; is amended by adding an entirely new Section 2-234., captioned "Medical benefits and continuation of medical benefits for class A, B, and C plan members." To read as follows:

"Sec. 2-234. Medical benefits and continuation of medical benefits for class A, B, and C plan members.

The city shall make available to retired members in plan classes A, B, and C continued medical insurance coverage until the age of 65, as long as such coverage is available to the city. In the event the Other Pension Benefits Trust, under agreement dated November 29, 2017, established and funded by the city, does not pay for the medical insurance premiums of such retired members, then the city shall pay for such medical insurance premiums to provide continued medical insurance coverage for such retired members until age 65. At the election of the retired member made as of the date of retirement and as long as such coverage is available to the city, the spouse to whom a retired member is married as of the date of retirement and such retired member's dependent children as of the date of retirement shall be eligible for medical insurance coverage provided by the city if so designated by a retired member. For the avoidance of doubt, only the spouse designated for medical insurance coverage by a retired member as of the date of retirement shall be eligible for medical insurance coverage. For the avoidance of doubt, children born or adopted after the date of retirement of a retired member shall not be eligible for medical insurance coverage. The premiums for any medical insurance coverage for a spouse and dependent children of a retired member shall be at the expense of such retired member. The spouse of a retired member shall cease to be eligible for medical insurance coverage up on reaching age 65, upon the death of the retired member to whom the spouse was married, or upon divorce from the retired member to whom the spouse was married. The dependent children of a retired member shall cease to be eligible for such medical insurance coverage upon (i) ceasing to meet the eligibility requirements of for dependent children under the plan providing medical insurance coverage and/or (ii) upon the death of the retired member.

SECTION VI

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that Chapter 2, captioned "Administration", Article V, captioned "Retirement"; Division 3, captioned "Pensions; Defined benefit"; is amended by adding entirely new Sections 2-235-2-259., captioned "Reserved." to read as follows:

"Secs. 2-235-2-259. Reserved"

SECTION VII

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this ordinance shall be effective immediately on the date of its final reading and passage.

SECTION VIII

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION IX

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED and it is hereby declared to be intention of the Mayor and Council of the City of Thomasville that all sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrase of this Ordinance are and were, upon their enactment, believed by the Mayor and the Council to be fully valid, enforceable, and constitutional.

SECTION X

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED and it is hereby declared by the Mayor and the Council of the City of Thomasville that (i) to the greatest extent allowed by law, each and every section paragraph sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is severable from every other section paragraph sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance and (ii) that to the greatest extent allowed by law, no section paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is mutually dependent upon any other section paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of This ordinance.

SECTION XI

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED and it is hereby declared that in the event that any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall, for any reason whatsoever, be declared invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by the valid judgement or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, it is the express intent of the Mayor and the Council of the City of Thomasville that such invalidity, unconstitutionality or unenforceability shall, to the greatest extent allowed by law, not render invalid unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or section of the Ordinance and that to the greatest extent allowed by law, all remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections of this ordinance shall remain valid, constitutional, enforceable, and of full force and effect.

SECTION XII

This ordinance was introduced and read at a lawful meeting of the City council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia, held June 8, 2026, and read the second time, passed and adopted in like meeting held on June 22, 2026.

NEW BUSINESS

Resolution to authorize submission of FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant Application.

Asst. Fire Chief/Medical Supervisor, Craig Dukes, reported that The primary goal of the Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) is to meet the firefighting and emergency response needs of fire departments and non-affiliated emergency medical service organizations. This project will provide Firefighter safety and operational readiness equipment. The project consists of equipment acquisition, to support firefighter health and safety, respiratory protection, and equipment decontamination. Thomasville Fire & Rescue requests Council's approval to apply for the FY2025 FEMA AFG to obtain new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBAs) for all forty-five (45) currently funded fire fighter positions. The current SCBAs are in disrepair, and the manufacturer warranty does not cover repairs. Our firefighters need this protective equipment to continue to protect the citizens of Thomasville. The application will include a request for an SCBA washer. The department currently lacks dedicated specialized equipment for thorough cleaning and decontamination of SCBA components and associated gear. Contaminants remaining on SCBAs and related equipment can continue exposing firefighters long after emergency incidents conclude. The proposed equipment directly supports firefighter health, safety, and long-term occupational cancer prevention efforts. The estimated total project cost: \$490,000.00 | GRANT: \$465,500.00 | LOCAL MATCH \$24,500.00. It was requested that City Council approve a resolution authorizing the City of Thomasville to apply for the FY2025 FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant for equipment purchases outlined above. Approval of the resolution will also authorize the Mayor or Mayor Pro Tempore to execute all necessary and related documents associated with the grant application and resulting award. Additionally, it was requested that the City Council authorize the Grants Administrator, or his/her designee, to submit all necessary and related documents through the online application system and to provide the required application assurances, certifications, and acknowledgements on behalf of the City Council as necessary to complete and submit the application. The resolution also authorizes the commitment and appropriation of funds in the FY2027 Budget in the amount of \$490,000.00, representing the City's required local match and any related grant-funded project costs, contingent upon award approval.

Councilmember Mobley moved to approve the resolution to authorize the submission of FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant Application, as presented. Councilmember Baker seconded. There was no discussion. The motion passed 5-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Chastain, Brown, Mobley, Scott, Baker.

The approved resolution follows.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program (AFG) is a federal grant program administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to provide funding assistance to fire departments for critical equipment, training, and related needs that enhance firefighter safety and emergency response capabilities; and,

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, desires to support Thomasville Fire Rescue in improving firefighter safety, respiratory protection, and cancer prevention and,

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, desires to submit an application for the FY2025 FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program to obtain funding assistance for eligible equipment purchases, including but not limited to Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA), SCBA washer/extractor equipment, and related eligible equipment, training, and implementation costs; and,

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, desires to commit and appropriate the required local matching funds and any related grant-funded project costs in the FY2027 Budget in the amount of \$490,000.00, contingent upon award approval; and,

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, desires to authorize the Mayor or Mayor Pro Tempore to sign all necessary and related documents, as shall be necessary in relation to the FY2025 FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant application and any resulting award; and,

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, desires to authorize the Grants Administrator, or his/her designee, to submit all necessary and related documents through the online application system and to provide any required application assurances, certifications, and acknowledgments on behalf of the City Council as necessary to complete and submit the application.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, hereby authorizes the submittal of an application for the FY2025 FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program to obtain funding assistance for eligible equipment purchases and related costs for Thomasville Fire Rescue; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, further authorizes the commitment and appropriation of funds in the FY2027 Budget in the amount of \$490,000.00, representing the City's required local match and any related grant-funded project costs, contingent upon award approval; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, further authorizes the Mayor or Mayor Pro Tempore of the City of Thomasville, or his/her successor, as the signatory on all necessary and related documents as shall be necessary in relation to the FY2025 FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant application and any resulting award; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, further authorizes the Grants Administrator or his/her designee to submit all necessary and related documents through the online application system and to provide any required application assurances, certifications, acknowledgments, and related submissions on behalf of the City Council

as necessary to complete and submit the application.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED by the Council of the City of Thomasville, Georgia, on this, the 22nd day of JUNE 2026.

Resolution to award bid for the purchase of new utility billing solution and to authorize the Mayor or Mayor Pro Tem to sign all necessary and related documents.

Managing Director of Customer Service, Mark Parrillo, reported that The City of Thomasville's financial stability relies heavily on its utility operations, which spans Electric, Natural Gas, Water, Wastewater (sewer), Solid Waste, and Stormwater services. Managing these complex operations requires a highly comprehensive, specialized utility billing platform capable of executing the entire "meter-to-cash" cycle. To maintain operational efficiency, this software must process massive volumes of consumption data, handle fluctuating rates and taxes, and manage physical infrastructure assets in real time. Furthermore, optimizing the process from the initial meter read to the final customer payment experience demands tight integration with the City's Geographic Information Systems (GIS), work order management, and financial reporting platforms. To eliminate inefficient manual data tracking, streamline internal operations, and elevate the public service standard, the City of Thomasville launched a major utility billing system replacement initiative in June 2025 designed to enhance both the staff and customer experience. The City issued and distributed a Request for Proposals (RFP) on June 9, 2025, receiving submissions from eight vendors. An evaluation committee thoroughly reviewed and scored each proposal. Following the final tally of these scores, the committee successfully shortlisted the top three vendors to advance in the selection process. A summary of proposals received follows.

Following months of rigorous software demonstrations, technical conference calls, and comprehensive reference checks, SpryPoint was selected as the chosen vendor. The finalized pricing encompasses a complete enterprise suite, including the following specialized modules:

- SpryCIS – Customer Information System
- SpryEngage – Customer Engagement Portal
- SpryMobile MFS – Mobile Field Service
- SpryIDM – Interval Data Management

Financially, a portion of this project was allocated within the 2026 capital budget under the Information Technology Fund to support its launch this fiscal year. With an estimated project timeline of 12 to 18 months for full implementation, the remaining project balance will roll over into the 2027 fiscal budget. Discussion ensued regarding the review process and customer use of payment methods.

Councilmember Scott moved to approve the resolution to award the bid to SpryPoint as presented. Councilmember Mobley seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed 5-0, with the following votes recorded: AYES: Chastain, Brown, Mobley, Scott, Baker.

WHEREAS, the City of Thomasville has it as their responsibility to provide comprehensive, specialized utility billing for Electric, Natural Gas, Water, Wastewater, Solid Waste and Stormwater customers and

WHEREAS, the Customer Service Department for the City of Thomasville, Georgia desires to optimize the process from the initial meter read to the final customer payment experience

and eliminate inefficient manual data tracking, streamline internal operations and elevate the public service standard and

WHEREAS, the City of Thomasville, Georgia developed and distributed a Request for Proposals (RFP) on June 9th 2025 for a new Utility Billing solution and

WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia desires to replace the current utility billing solution using funds from the 2026 capital budget under Information Technology to support its launch this fiscal year. With an estimated project timeline of 12 to 18 months for full implementation, the remaining project balance will roll in to the 2027 fiscal budget and

WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia desires to award a contract to SpryPoint in the amount of \$781,200 plus \$877,295 over 5 years to implement a new utility billing solution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. Incorporation of Recitals. The Recitals set forth above are incorporated herein by this reference as if set forth fully in this Section 1.

Section 2. Approval and Authorization of Award. The City Council for the City of Thomasville, Georgia approves the award amount attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit A ("Award") and authorizes the Mayor, or Mayor Pro Tempore in the Mayor's absence, to execute and deliver the Award to proceed.

Section 3. General Authority. From and after the approval of this Resolution, the Mayor, Mayor Pro Tempore, City Manager, officers, and employees of the City of Thomasville, Georgia are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to do all such acts and things and to execute all such documents as may be necessary to comply with the provisions of the Award as executed and are further authorized to take any and all further actions and execute and deliver any and all other documents and certificates, including but not limited to the Award, as may be necessary or desirable in connection with the execution and delivery of the Award and any related documents, all of the forgoing in consultation with the City Attorney.

Section 4. Actions Approved and Confirmed. All acts and doings of the City Council, Mayor, Mayor Pro Tempore, the City Manager, the officers, and employees of the City of Thomasville, Georgia that are in conformity with the purposes and intents of this Resolution and in the furtherance of the Award and the execution, delivery, and performance of the Award and related documents shall be, and the same hereby are, in all respects approved and confirmed.

Section 5. Severability of Invalid Provisions. If any one or more of the provisions herein contained shall be held contrary to any express provision of law or contrary to the policy of express law, though not expressly prohibited, or against public policy, or shall for any reason whatsoever be held invalid, then such provisions shall be null and void and shall be deemed separable from the remaining provisions and shall in no way affect the validity of any of the other provisions hereof or of the Award ratified hereunder.

Section 6. Repealing Clause. All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions herein contained are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded and repealed.

Section 7. Effective Date. This resolution shall be effective immediately upon its adoption.
